The countryside has always been important to the heart of English culture and <u>identity</u>, full of beautiful villages, peaceful communities, historic sites, and well-maintained natural features such as woods and plains. Even today, there are still many areas all over the country where the landscape has not changed for <u>centuries</u>.

The English countryside is full of national parks and protected regions known as Areas of Outstanding Natural <u>Beauty</u> (AONB). Areas such as the Lake District inspired the greatest English-language Romantic <u>poets</u>, such as Wordsworth, Tennyson, Keats, and Shelley.

English World Heritage Sites

England is home to _____19__ UNESCO World Heritage Sites. Notably, many of these are cultural sites, important historical markers in the development of modern technological and social changes.

One of the most famous of these is the Stonehenge area, 5000-year old <u>monuments</u> and prehistoric buildings on Salisbury Plain in Wiltshire. Another famous example is the city of Bath, named after the Roman Baths found there. These baths were built in <u>Roman</u> Britain, 2000 years ago.

Indeed, in cities such as Liverpool you will find many UNESCO-protected areas. During the 19th and early 20th century, Liverpool was one of the largest <u>ports</u> in the world. It was vital in maintaining the British Empire, was a major port of the slave trade until its abolition in 1807, and a major departure point for emigrants to *North America*.
