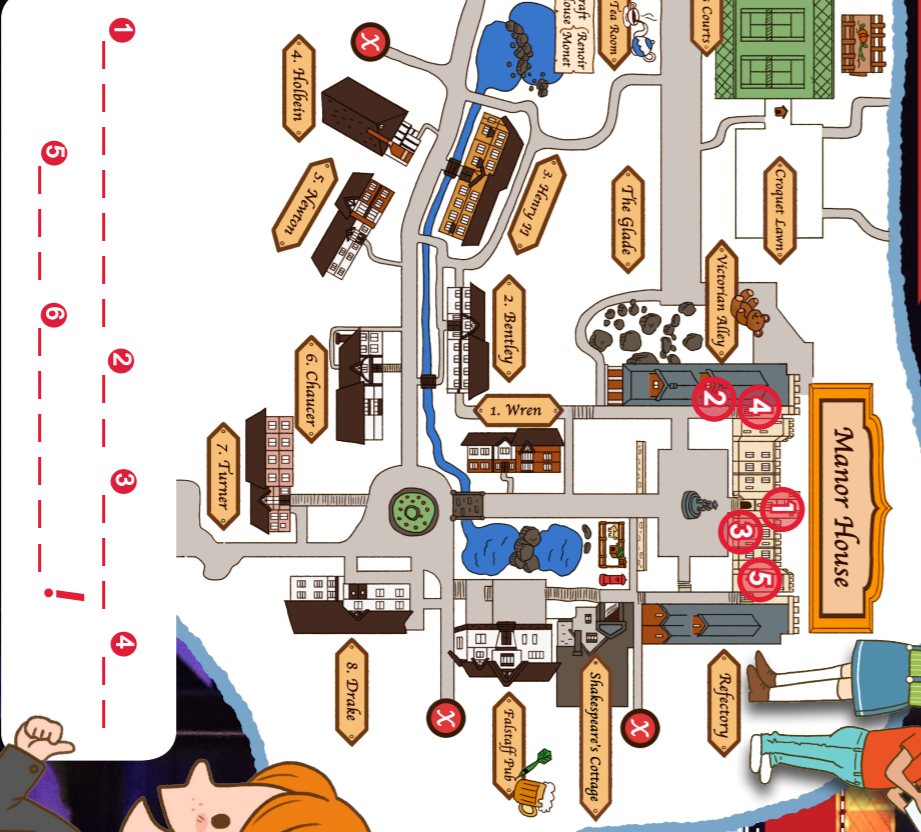

Trinidad and Tobago's 'Parang'

On the warm, breezy Caribbean islands of Trinidad and Tobago, there is no cold winter with freezing temperatures, snow and ice. Instead, we enjoy the tropical Christmas season at home or outdoors at fetes (parties), at the beach or the riverside. There is always lots of food and music, especially 'parang'.



Parang is a form of folk music, sung in Spanish, by a live band. The music was made with indigenous instruments



such as the cuatro (four-stringed guitar), toc-toc (wooden knocking sticks), box bass and tambourine. Traditionally, parang serenaders would go house to house and perform for family and friends, and be rewarded with local Christmas food such as pastelles and drink such as ponche cr ma.
